## Easy Vintage Victorian Ornament Project & Tutorial by Kat Lees

## Supply List

Victorian Die Cut - Glitter
Core Board or Cardboard
Elmer's Glue, paint brush & Hot Glue
Ribbon of choice for small bow
Wired Ribbon for Ruffle (2" wide)
Tulle
Decorative embellishments
String of Small Pearls
Oval Doilies

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(If using as an ornament don't forget to add a hanger).

Photo #1 & 2 - Set the Oval Doilies out and fold in half.

 $\underline{Photo} \# 3$  — Using one, fold the top two corners to the center as shown. Press lines well and set this aside for now.

<u>Photo #4</u> – Cut about a 2 or 3 inch wide piece of tulle (length the fit). Run a gathering stitch across the top and ruffle. Once it fits hot glue in place.

<u>Photo #5 & #6</u> — Get your die-cut photo out. Cut around the figure as shown. Pay attention to details when around the cutting.

<u>Whoto # 7</u> — (This is just an example of what you are soins to do). You are going to cut a length of foam core to hot glue on the back of your die cut figure.

The object is to the raise the figure from the back ground; add durability so that the figure does not bend.

## Do not let the foam show on the right side.

Photo #8 – Cut a 2  $\frac{1}{2}$  or 3 inch wide piece of tulle and length to fit. If wired just pull to fit. If not run a gathering stitch along one side and pull to fit.


This ruffle is going to fit under the folded area of the doilies. Once you have the right fit hot glue in place.

<u>Photo #9</u> – Fold the doilies ends back down & then hot glue our figure in place as shown.

<u>Photo # 10</u> – Cut a 2 inch wide length of ribbon to fit over the folded edges. Run a gathering stitch and ruffle it.

If wired already pull.
